**Tom Lujan:** Tom passed away just before Christmas. As most of you know Tom was a super Life Supporter, exceptional Tech School Instructor and a friend to all.

MSgt. Lujan was buried with Full Military Honors on 20 February 2004 at Arlington National Cemetery. He is resting at Court 6, Section MM, Stack 14 Number: 3. Those who have the chance are encouraged to stop by and pay your respects.

In attendance at the Ceremony were his brother Cippi Lujan and his son, his sister-in-law Shirley Lujan along with her stepson Michael and his wife. Representing the Life Support community were Chief Skip Clawson and his family and Chief Al Loving. As usual the USAF Honor Guard did themselves and the US Air Force proud. This was a very memorable ceremony.

Tom was living at the US Airmen and Soldiers Home in Washington DC at the time of his untimely death. Tom died as a result of complications following a fall in his room.

Tom had served at many locations during his time in the Air Force. A few of these were Chanute Air Force Base as Life Support Course Supervisor, Homestead Air Force Base as a Training Instructor, Castle Air Force Base as a Supervisor, numerous tours in Southeast Asia and Korea, and Carswell Air Force Base Texas. Upon retirement from the USAF he was with ILC Dover in California.

To say Tom will be missed is an understatement. Those of us who received the late night phone calls from Tom know how much he loved us and how much he loved his Air Force family. I believe that Tim Howard said it best. "Tom always thought of others first and would do whatever he could to help someone. He was always very proud that he served with and helped many excel in the Life Support Career Field and in the USAF."

His knowledge and background in the history of helmets was vast and he will be missed.
