Greetings to all, I hope everyone had a good winter. It's time to shed some clothes, get ready for some fun in the sun and our annual reunion.

I've received a lot of inquiries about this year's reunion so I'll get right to it.

The Tenth Annual Life Support Reunion will be held 26-29 Sept at the Flamingo Hotel in Laughlin, NV. Travel days are 26 and 30 Sept. If you plan on arriving a day or two early, or staying later than 30 September, call KB and let him know. Check-in at the hotel is not earlier than 3 PM on 26 Sept 05. All former, retired, active duty, AFR, ANG, DoD civilian, and contractor personnel in the Aircrew Life Support business, and their families and friends are invited to attend. To guarantee reservations complete the attached reservation form and send it in to the address indicated NLT 15 July 2005.

As all returning attendees know, Laughlin is located 90 miles south of Las Vegas, NV (217 miles from Phoenix, AZ) and is easily accessible via car or RV. Air travelers can fly directly into the Laughlin/Bullhead City Airport on many major airlines, commuter flights or private air charters. Free shuttle transfer service is available from the airport to the hotel. If you are flying into Las Vegas you should make reservation ASAP. August and September are the height of the

conference season in Vegas, which makes it very hard to get flight reservations. Just about everything you'll need is in the hotel so a rental car is not a necessity. There is a shuttle van you can catch from the Vegas airport to Laughlin (Tri-State Super Shuttle, 1-800-801-8687). To ensure you'll get a seat, a 14 day advanced reservation is encouraged. Check with the information booth as you come out of baggage pick-up. They can tell you where to meet the shuttle.

#### **TAPS**

Back in January of this year we lost Carl Jennings. Carl as a lot of you know was an instructor at Chanute. He and his bride Ruby attended several reunions and were very popular judging by all the people that gathered around them. Carl always had interesting stories about the early days at Chanute and usually came to the reunion with lots of old class photos. I had hoped to get a copy of those photos so that I could post them to the web site. The interesting thing about Carl that I didn't know was that he was also a veteran of the US Navy. He served in World War 11, Korea and Vietnam. While in the Navy, he worked as a fireman. After retiring from the AF, Carl worked in supply at Seymour Johnson AFB. Carl was 76 when he died.

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George Braue received a call from Ken Marks stating that Fred Ewing had passed away at age 89. George stated and I quote, "I want you young guys to know that I remember Fred starting from the 50's when he had the Water Survival School out at Langley. In the later years he had the school in Japan, but I'm not sure about Okinawa. Fred also built up the Jungle Survival School during the Vietnam era. He had a large impact on the Life Support/Survival arenas. His efforts played a large part in the safe return of many downed

aircrew members, be it from combat or accident situations. Fred's teachings were a key factor in the return of the involved aircrew personnel. I know of at least 776 crewmen by 1969 in South East Asia that used Fred's training to survive and return ALIVE".

#### Life Support Coin

As indicated on the web page, I am completely out of coins and will not order anymore until I get enough requests that total 300 or more. So far I have had about 6 requests that total about 50 coins. If you or your unit would like to have some of these coins on hand for future retirements or other occasions, let me know ASAP so that I can get them on order. It's been reported to me that some people have discovered that the enlisted rank on the coin will eventually rub off. My guess is that excessive handling will cause this and that there is nothing anyone can do to prevent it short of keeping the coin in its original zip lock bag (that is if you're going to carry it around in your pocket). I will check with the vendor to see if anything can be done to eliminate this problem in the next batch.
