A Note From Robert Chad Le Beau



Attached is a photo of TSgt. Billy J. Hood, Personal Equipment Shop Chief, 375th Air Base Wing, Scott AFB, Illinois. They flew T-33's and had the old P-4B Flight helmets with the MS22001 Oxygen Masks. The photo was taken

in 1960. Maybe someone will remember him? He started it all for me and if it wasn't for him there would be no ALSET Tester in AFE today.

TSgt Hood was my first contact with USAF PE when I attended a 1960-Armed Forces Day Scott AFB Air Show at age 14. The PE Shop had a big display of survival equipment on a board and a T-33 ejection seat you could sit in. He gave my father and I a guided tour of the PE shop after the Air Show. I was hooked on flight equipment after that and today I have a vast collection of all eras flying helmets and oxygen masks and even a T-33 ejection seat.

The Air Show was also impressive with parachutist and stunt flyers, it was my first and I went on to make 2,397 parachute jumps and become an Air Show performing stuntman for 3 years with a Husband & Wife Wing Riding Team (the Flying Pierces) after my active duty AF years.

I performed the American Flag parachute Jump to open the Air Shows and the car-to-plane transfer and a cut-away parachute at the end of the Air Show. I joined the Air Force in 1966 with 200 parachute jumps and they made me a Medic for 4 years???

Years Later (1979) I joined the Missouri Air Guard (St. Louis) and entered into the parachute shop as a rigger, later transferring over to the Life Support Shop and attending USAF Life Support School at Chanute AFB in 1990. We flew F-4 & F-15's at the time. It was during this time I knew we need better test equipment than all the old stuff we were using. It took a few more years to develop the ALSET Tester but I am proud that today it has made life in the career field easier for all my fellow AFE brothers and sisters.

So that explains a how I have that photo I took of TSgt Bill J. Hood back in 1960.

Chief's Corner - CMSgt Ken Boteler

Greetings to all that may read this! I have come to the end of my career in the world's greatest Air Force. I was very fortunate to have been able to serve an amazing 30 years. I entered the Air Force on 1 December 1988, so my official retirement date will be 1 December 2018.

I was extremely lucky to have a very diverse career in the Air Force. I started off in the Supply career field; and did pick-up and delivery, receiving and local purchase receiving. This experience came in handy when I crossed trained into then Life Support.

My first duty station as a Life Supporter was Pope AFB, NC. I spent 3 years then decided that I wanted to try and fix the Air Force and the quality of enlistees; so I volunteered and was selected to become a recruiter.

I recruited for about 3 years in Waukegan Illinois, then went on to be a job counselor at the Des Plaines MEPS for about 1 ½ years. Once I completed this tour I returned to Life Support and found myself in Columbus MS. From there I was fortunate to get a call from Chief Mendez asking me if I would like to go to the school house, which I gladly accepted and packed my bags for Sheppard AFB to become an instructor.

Going to Sheppard was truly a challenge and a rewarding experience to be able to instruct and be involved in the development of the career field. So, as you can see, I was not a typical born and raised Life Supporter.

While I was at Sheppard, I was tasked along with Mr. Everett, and Mrs. Redfern to attend the Life Support and Survival Equipment merger meetings at Langley. What an event this turned out to be. Initially, we were giving free reins to come up with a plan for a newly merged technical school to produce what would be our newest AFSC, 1P0X1 Aircrew Flight Equipment.

I can tell you this; the first draft we came up with was a very robust and longer technical school, with different tracks. One for heavies, fighters, helos, bombers, and trainers. Unfortunately, this drove too large of a manpower bill for instructors and the overall cost. So, it was struck down and we had to go back to the drawing board and come up with something within budgetary constraints. I can honestly say that I was not a fan of what we had to present, and not merging the school house at the beginning of the merger. I said it then and I will say it now.....this caused a huge training burden on the field and we truly were not producing a 1P0X1. We felt the effects of this for many years.

As I left the school house and headed to Minot AFB, ND we faced a true identity crisis. We were getting folks out to the bases as 1P0X1A and 1P0X1B. Truly at that point we were still Life Support and Survival Equipment. We had not changed the culture at the school house, so our brand new AFE'rs felt that they were still Life Support or Survival equipment since we were still technically running two separate school houses.

That was then. Now fast forward to today...we have been merged for around 11 years now. In that time frame, I got to run wings at Minot, Osan, Little Rock, and Kadena as an AFE Superintendent. I spent my last six years as an Operations Group Superintendent at Kadena and Ellsworth.

What I have experienced and observed in that time frame is two separate career fields work extremely hard to truly merge. We may have not gotten everything right, but what I can say is that we have come a long way since that first year as a merged career field.

What I have witnessed is a group of truly dedicated Airman that call themselves AFE! From our lowest ranking Airmen to our Career Field Manager(s), we have some of the hardest working, dedicated, and innovative Airman that you could ever ask for. Our Superintendents have a tough job in trying to run an AFE program, while trying to balance the needs of a Squadron and Group Commander for bodies. With that being said, I would like to give my two cents on where I think AFE should go from here.

I believe in order for us to continue to evolve as a career field, we need to invest in a few areas. The first one is our training. Currently, it seems like our training is not very standardized. I believe we should look towards creating and maintaining virtual reality training. If this platform is utilized correctly, AFE would have a standardized training platform, plus it falls in line with our Generation X'ers and Generation Z's.

The second area that I believe we need to invest in and bring back is our 7-level training. I understand that for quite some time this training was no more than a two-week drinking opportunity. However, if properly built and utilized; I believe that we could help our new SSgt take on and become more successful in their new rolls as NCOs, and NCOICS.

Well, with that being said; I believe that I have rambled on long enough. I truly believe that AFE has a great future ahead of it. There will be challenges, no doubt about it. But what I saw as I was ending my tour, was truly a bunch of hard charging individuals that will take all of those challenges head-on and will ensure that AFE succeeds in what our most important job is...ENSURING THE SAFETY OF OUR AIRCREW.

Monday, 16 Sept and Friday, 20 Sept are travel days so start making plans to attend now. For those of you who would like to arrive a day early (Sunday, 15 Sept), you will get the discounted rate as long as you indicate you are coming in for the reunion. All veterans, retired, active duty, Guard, Reserve, and civilian personnel who are working or worked in the USAF Personal or Survival Equipment career fields, Aircrew Life Support or Flight Equipment career fields, or members of other branches of the US military in related professions and their quests are invited to attend.

HOTEL RESERVATION: Hotel Rates: \$52.00 plus tax per night Sunday, 15 September through Thursday, 19 September single or double occupancy. The hotel will waive the \$17.99 resort fee per night for the group. Early reservation at the hotel is encouraged. You can either go on-line to www.OrleansCasino.com/groups and use group code: A9USC09 or call into Hotel Reservations at 800-675-3267! To avoid long hold times, we recommend making your reservations on-line. Reservations must be made on or before 17 August 2019 to ensure availability and group rate. Group rate will not apply after the cutoff date.

Any rooms requiring triple or quad occupancy will be surcharged an additional \$20.00 per guest, per room, per night. (Children age fourteen and under, in the same room with parents in existing bedding, are free.) Room rates are subject to Clark County room tax, which is currently thirteen percent (13%) - subject to change. Additional person in the room over two (2) will be at twenty-dollars (\$20.00) per person, per night, plus room tax. Children twelve (12) and under may share the same room with parents at no additional charge.

There will be a \$6.00 plus tax daily charge for in-room Wi-Fi. Guests requesting Wi-Fi connectivity are to notify the front desk that they would like to pay for this service upon arrival.

<u>The Aftermath of Hurricane Michael</u> and the California Fires

The fire that began in Northern California became the country's deadliest in over a century. The Camp Fire, as it is now called nearly destroyed the town of Paradise, CA and has resulted in more than 8,000 homes lost, the death of at least 85 people with hundreds still missing and unaccounted for. That fire has finally been contained after burning for more than 2 weeks.

The Southern California fires killed 3 people and destroyed over 1600 buildings, mostly homes in the areas of Malibu and unincorporated areas of LA County. This fire was fully contained by Nov 21st.

I don't know of anyone in our profession that was affected by these fires, but the results of the hurricane in the southeastern part of the country is different.

That storm tore through Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina and finally southeastern Virginia was both devastating and remarkable.

When it was over, Tyndall AFB was in ruins. There were no reported injuries, in part because nearly all personnel had been ordered to leave in advance of the hurricane's landfall.

Helicopter footage of the base showing hangars that had easily survived past storms was riddled with gaping holes and many of the buildings were "a complete loss." The marina, its structures, and docks were also destroyed.

All base houses sustained severe or significant roof and siding damage. Some dorms at Tyndall fared well, but others sustained severe damage and stood open to the sky.

The eye of the storm cut directly over the base. Splintered or bent trees and stormproof roofs only a few months old were peeled like old paint and were scraped away. An F-15 on display at the base entrance was ripped from its foundation and pitched onto its back amid twisted flagpoles and uprooted trees.

According to an article that I read, "The destruction of an air force base can only be matched in scope by the pounding that Hurricane Andrew gave Homestead Air Force Base, just south of Miami, in 1992. That Category 5 storm, with winds estimated at 150 m.p.h., smashed hangars and left battered fighter jets and mammoth cargo planes in pieces on the runway. Nearly all of the surviving planes and personnel were reassigned to other bases.

Two years later, it reopened as a smaller, Air Force Reserve base". The article also stated that after sustaining catastrophic damage many have expressed concern that Tyndall Air Force Base will go the way of Homestead. But "Tyndall

will be rebuilt, and it will be an example of a modern U.S. Air Force base".

As of early December several Tyndall Air Force Base services have returned to operation nearly 50 days after Hurricane Michael walloped the base.

Roughly 3,500 airmen are now stationed on Tyndall, while 575 are currently assigned on temporary duty there.

Some of the permanent-party airmen have been given hardened lodging, and some of them are residing in Tent City, along with TDY personnel.

If all this devastation happened on Tyndall AFB, imagine what the town of Panama City must have gone through.

When the storm was over, I posted the following on Facebook: "Now that the storm is over, I've been worried about my friends in the Florida Panhandle area. Anybody know if Leaster and Irene Williamson, Wil and Mary Oost, Barbara Duren and others are okay?" Below is the answer Deborah Crumley posted.

"There are some things you wish you had not seen. We are in the Panama City area, staying at Riley Maze Crumley's sisters in Panama City Beach. We did find that Will and Mary Oost are safe, although they did sustain damage. In fact, although we knew where they lived, we had a terrible time finding it. We went to Fam Camp, it's not there, we decided against going on base. I still cannot wrap my head around it all. What you have seen online or on TV does not do it justice. Please remember everyone in your prayers. But let's not forget the rest of our nation that has suffered great loss. I tagged everyone I know so please pass this info on to other Air Crew Life Support members."

I was relieved when I read that, but I'm still concerned about the other friends in that area that I've heard nothing about.
