## **Chief's Corner**

#### What's Up At The SPO

Mission: Save or Improve Airman's Lives

Human Systems (HS) enhance warfighter performance, increases protection, reduces injuries, and increases survival rates. We at the Human Systems Program Office receive our charge straight from AFI 11-301 Volume 1 where it states "Provide USAF aircrew safe and effective aircrew flight equipment and programs to increase aircrew performance." It further outlines that we should protect and sustain human life during flight operations, prepare aircrew and passengers to survive, affect their rescue, and return to duty if forced to abandon their aircraft during an emergency. Finally, our mission charges us to provide aircrew protection from effects Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear (CBRN) weapons.

Most of you will recognize this mission or at least some portion of it from your time serving in the Air As the current Air Force Life Cycle Management Center AFE Chief, I believe our program office has been moving at a pace never seen to date. This is for multiple reasons, but mainly based off the overarching push from Air Force leadership to be more innovative and pursue speed with discipline on all programs. The days of fielding equipment in 5-10 years are considered unacceptable (you were saying they were in our time too!) and we must procure and sustain AFE faster to keep ahead of our adversaries. accomplish this goal our office is using multiple approaches to navigate quickly in and around the normal acquisition process. One such approach is Try-Decide-Buy. This strategy allows us to

purchase potential solutions or devices (multiple vendors), try them out by doing local testing (heat, cold, vibration etc.), then decide on which product is best for the user (MAJCOMs provide feedback) and then buy the best device. We recently utilized this program for the first time to field the Survival Kit Electronic Signaling Device (SKED), which replaced the PRC-90 Radio as a Peacetime signaling device. Our office was able to field over 12,000 assets from start to finish in 9 months.



This is just the beginning. We are also working with AFWERX to draw in competition we would not normally have in the helmet business. AFWERX provided an avenue to open the aperture to companies that would not normally be interested in government work by ensuring them we would move rapidly and not get bogged down with the normal government acquisition process. The result was, 101 submissions were evaluated and of those, three top vendors (LIFT, ASU and GENTEX) were selected to move forward with proof of concept designs. This is huge because previously only one company would have come forward to compete. Later this month, our team will be at AFWERX to receive 4 proof of concept helmets from each of the three companies. Amazingly, we selected these three companies in December 2018 and they were challenged to provide prototypes to us in less than six months. This is evidence that these new approaches to acquisition are working not only for us in the acquisitions world but for the Warfighter who requires the most up-to-date technology to accomplish the mission.



Another positive win for the warfighter is the current fielding of the BA-30 Low Profile Parachute (LPP), this parachute had been used by AFSOC solely, but now we are fielding it (710 so far) to all Airframes utilizing Back Style parachutes as a replacement for the BA-18, -22 etc. (minus B-52, we are still conducting testing).



It is exciting to see the progress, upgrades, and replacement of equipment items that most of us have worked on over our entire careers, which leads me to my final thoughts.

I would be failing at my job if I did not address the fact, the Air Force as a whole has placed a focus on Female Flight Equipment issues. As more and more female aviators join our ranks, we continue to provide equipment to them that is considered either male or unisex sizes. In order to better serve our female aviators, our office is concentrating efforts on female specific needs and how our flight equipment affects their ability to accomplish their mission. With support from Air Force leadership, we have been able to tackle some of the items of concern, though we have only scratched the surface of where we need to be heading. We've been working with

our sister service partners to provide items like the AMXDmax urinary device and other possible solutions utilizing the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program.

We are also working hard to establish a better method for ensuring we address female specific equipment, whether that is better accessibility to female flight suits, creating a better Anti-Exposure suits (fighters), or a better survival vest and harness, that fits females and smaller stature male aircrew. As more challenges present themselves our office continues to partner with industry and our AFE community to ensure we are saving or improving airman's lives every day.

### USAF Personal Equipment, Aircrew Life Support, Survival Equipment, and Aircrew Flight Equipment (USAF PE/ALS/SE/AFE) Reunion

The 24th Annual USAF PE/SE/ALS/AFE Reunion will be held at the Orleans Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, NV starting Monday 16 Sept 2019 thru Thursday 19 Sept 2019. Travel days are Monday, 16 Sept and Friday, 20 Sept. If you would like to arrive a day early (Sunday, 15 Sept), you will get the discounted rate as long as you indicate you are coming in for the All veterans, retired, active duty, Guard, Reserve, and civilian personnel who are working or worked in the USAF Personal or Survival Equipment career fields, Aircrew Life Support or Flight Equipment career fields, or members of other branches of the US military in related professions and their guests are invited to attend.

**HOTEL RESERVATION:** Our group room rate is \$52.00 plus tax per night single or double occupancy. The hotel will waive the \$17.99 resort fee per night for the group. reservation at the hotel is encouraged especially since there is a limited number of non-smoking rooms. To do so, go online to www.OrleansCasino.com/groups and use group code: A9USC09 or call into Hotel Reservations at 800-675-3267! To avoid long hold times we recommend making your reservations on-line. Reservations must be made on or before 8/17/2019 to ensure availability and group rate. Group rate will not apply after the cutoff date.

Any room requiring triple or quad occupancy will be surcharged an additional \$20.00 per guest, per room, per night. (Children age fourteen and under, in the same room with parents in existing bedding, are free.) Room rates are subject to Clark County room tax, which is currently thirteen percent (13%)-subject to change.

There will be a \$6.00 plus tax daily charge for in-room Wi-Fi. Guests requesting Wi-Fi connectivity are to notify the front desk that they would like to pay for this service upon arrival. A photo ID will be required upon checkin.

Upon arrival, all guests will be required to post a \$100.00 security deposit via a credit card to secure their individual room accounts. The hotel reserves the right to retain the security deposit and charge the credit card utilized for the security deposit any additional amounts necessary to fully compensate the hotel for: (1) any damage to any of the hotel rooms (including the cost of repair and lost revenue for any time during which the hotel room cannot be utilized because of such repair work); and (2) the costs associated with any excessive cleanup of any hotel room that may be necessary as a result of the condition of any hotel room used by our group.

HOTEL CANCELLATION: Hotel policy for cancellation of an individual guaranteed reservation is at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to scheduled arrival date. Rooms released less than forty-eight (48) hours prior to arrival date and all no-shows will be subject to a cancellation penalty equivalent to the first night's room and tax.

HOTEL CHECK-IN/CHECK OUT: Checkin for individual arrivals begins at 3:00 p.m. Check-out time is at 12:00 noon. The hotel agrees to make rooms available prior to the stated check-in time and to extend late check-out to guests on a preferential basis, if available. The hotel may request early check-in fee or late check-out fee. The fee may vary and will be determined at the time of the request.

**REUNION CHECK-IN:** After getting your room, look for the reunion check-in counter/booth in the hotel lobby to get your reunion package. Don't forget to stop by our hospitality room after 5:30 PM for food and drinks.

Are you one of those people who truly *disliked* your time in the military? Regardless of the amount of time you served, if you view your time in the military as something you'd like to forget, and you believe attending our reunion is not going to help, give us a chance to change your mind.

The 2019 Personal/Survival Equipment, Aircrew Life Support/Aircrew Flight Equipment reunion is gearing up once again, and many people around the country have decisions to make.
